Who should respond to this survey?

The respondent should hold executive power in the city or local government. Often this person is the mayor, but in some contexts this person has another title, such as municipal commissioner, governor, town clerk, chief executive, district magistrate, or chairperson.

The survey takes 20 minutes. At the end of the survey there is a button to submit your final answers. Before you press the submit button, you can close the survey window at any time, your answers will be saved, and you can return to complete the survey at your convenience.
